How and when did you first learn of Ag in the Classroom?

I first learned about Ag in the Classroom while I was taking college courses at Cal Poly Pomona. I heard wonderful things about how they advocate for agriculture.

How long have you taught students and why did you choose to become an educator?

This year I completed my first year as a high school agriculture teacher. I decided I wanted to become an agriculture teacher after my freshman year of high school. I took a ton of agriculture classes and they all got me hooked.

What is your favorite AITC program/resource/event and why?

I really enjoy all of the grant options that Ag in the Classroom provides. This year our program was lucky enough to be given a grant to restart our poultry units. This included housing for laying hens and the hens themselves. These resources provide hands-on experience for the students while allowing them to work at something they truly enjoy.

Has agriculture continued to impact the way you educate students?

I teach all agriculture classes, and it really plays a huge part in my classes. I teach all of my students how important the industry is and it is fun to show them how much the industry impacts us all.

Tell us about one person who has most influenced your own education and educational care.

Mrs. Miser, Miss Richmond to me at the time, was one of my favorite teachers. I always was looking forward to her class and participating in the FFA activities that she coached. I have only wanted to be an agriculture teacher since then. She showed me how important being a teacher is and how much of an impact you can have on the lives of your students.

Tell us about a golden teaching moment.

One of my golden teaching moments was with a student who was considered "a bad kid" by many of his other teachers. He didn't really do his work, he didn't get along with other students, and he was always in the office for being in trouble. At the beginning of the year I convinced him to participate in one of our public speaking competitions. The day before the competition

he was in trouble and had been suspended for the day. Because of that I had to tell him that he couldn't compete. The next day at school he was so upset that he vowed he wouldn't miss the next one. From that day on he turned his life around and ended the year with a 3.0 GPA, the highest he has ever had. I asked him why he cared so much, and he said, "Because I'm not going to let you down again."

Do you have any advice for other teachers on implementing agriculture into the classroom?

The biggest piece of advice I could give someone is to do your research, and don't be afraid to ask questions. There are so many misconceptions about the agriculture industry and the best thing you can do to advocate for it is to make sure you are doing so with the truth.

Why do you believe it is important for our students to be agriculturally literate and aware in today's society?

I feel that it is vital that people are literate in the agriculture industry. One of my favorite sayings was by Brenda Schoepp. She said, "My grandfather used to say that once in your life you need a doctor, a lawyer, a policeman and a preacher, but every day, three times a day, you need a farmer." This depicts the necessity of the industry, and people need to realize that no matter what happens, it is the industry of life.
